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## Ukrainian Ethnic Population in Canada

### Based on Statistics Canada 2016 Census of National Household Survey

#### Highlights

- Edmonton continues to have the largest Ukrainian population of 159,945 (11.8% of the Ukrainian ethnic population in Canada), which increased by 8.0% and represents 12.1% of the population of Edmonton (CMA).
- Toronto has the second largest Ukrainian population of 144,335 (10.6% of the Ukrainian ethnic population in Canada), which increased significantly by 10.7% and represents 2.4% of the population of Toronto (CMA).
- Winnipeg has the third largest Ukrainian population of 116,250 (8.5% of the Ukrainian population in Canada), which increased by 0.9% and represents 14.9% of Winnipeg (CMA).
- Vancouver has the fourth largest Ukrainian population of 94,400 (6.9% of the Ukrainian population in Canada), which increased significantly by 11.5% and represents 3.8% of Vancouver (CMA).
- Ukrainians make up over 10% of the population of these cities – Saskatoon (16.6%), Winnipeg (14.9%), Thunder Bay (13.2%) Regina (12.8%) and Edmonton (12.1%). [see page 9]
- The following cities have seen their Ukrainian ethnic populations grow by 30% or more since the last census – Nelson, British Columbia (68.1%), Steinbach, Manitoba (51.7%), Swift Current, Saskatchewan (44.2%), Montreal, Quebec (31.3%), High River, Alberta (30.1%) and Chilliwack, British Columbia (30.0%). #### Provincial Statistics

The Ukrainian Ethnic population in Canada grew faster than the Canadian population grew in the census period 1997-2001 (4.3% compared to 4.0%) and 2002-2006 (12.9% compared to 5.4%). However, in 2007-2011 census period, the Ukrainian ethnic population grew at a slower rate (3.5% compared 5.9%). In the 2012-2016 census period, the Ukrainian Ethnic population in Canada grew at a faster rate than the Canadian population (8.7% vs 5.0%).

Based on the 2016 census, Ukrainian ethnic population represented 3.87% of the total Canadian population an increase from 3.74% in 2011 census.

Ontario saw significant growth of 10.1% in the 2011-2016 census period and **now has the largest Ukrainian ethnic population** of 376,440 or 27.7% of the Ethnic Ukrainians in Canada taken over first place from Alberta. Alberta has seen its Ukrainian ethnic population grow by 6.9% and is in second place with 27.1% Ethnic Ukrainians in Canada.

Surprisingly, both British Columbia and Quebec both saw their Ukrainian Ethnic populations increase significantly in the 2011-2016 census period compared to the previous census period.

British Columbia's Ukrainian Ethnic population increased by 25,620 people or 12.6% compared to 3.2% in the previous census period. Immigration from Ukraine represented 1,230 of those people or 4.8% and remaining increase probably came from inter-provincial migration or Ethnic Ukrainians from other countries.

Quebec's Ukrainian Ethnic population increased significantly by 10,285 or 31.9% compared to 1.0% in the previous census period. Immigration from Ukraine represented 2,460 of those people or 23.9% and remaining increase probably came from inter-provincial migration or Ethnic Ukrainians from other countries.

- Based on the **2006 census** the Ukrainian mother tongue population represented only 11.1% of the Ukrainian population – 134,495 Ukrainians said that their mother tongue was Ukrainian out of 1,209,090 who said that they were Ukrainian.
- Based on the 2006 census - Montreal based mother tongue Ukrainians represented 22.6% of the Ukrainian living in Montreal – the largest percentage.
- Based on the 2006 census - Toronto based mother tongue Ukrainians represented 20.3% of the Ukrainian living in Toronto.
- Quebec and Ontario mother tongue Ukrainians represented 16.9% and 14.4% of the Ukrainian ethnic population in those provinces.

## Based on Statistics Canada 2011 Census of Urban Centres - Mother Tongue.

- The number of Ukrainians surveyed in **2011 census** by Statistics Canada saying that Ukrainian is their mother tongue has decreased by 17.1% to 111,530 from 134,495, and represents 8.9% of the 1,251,170 Ethnic Ukrainians.
- Toronto continues to have the largest Ukrainian mother tongue population of 25,540, which decreased by only 6.4% and represents 22.9% of the Ukrainians in Canada (based on mother tongue). This smaller decline is probably due to the large influx of Ukrainian speaking immigrants from Ukraine which have chosen Toronto as their home.
- Edmonton has the second largest Ukrainian mother tongue population of 13,465, which decreased by 16.6% and represents 12.1% of the Ukrainians in Canada (based on mother tongue).
- Winnipeg has the third largest Ukrainian mother tongue population of 10,400, which decreased by 19.5% and represents 9.3% of the Ukrainians in Canada (based on mother tongue).
- Ukrainians have become more urban over the last 5 years with almost 70% of mother tongue Ukrainians living major urban centres.
- There has been a slower decline in the number of mother tongue Ukrainians in the urban centres – declined by 16.3% compared to 18.7% in the smaller centres and rural Canada.
- There are more female Ukrainian mother tongue Canadians (61,940) than male Ukrainian mother Canadians (49,495) and the females represent 55.6% of the Ukrainian mother tongue population in Canada.

## Based on Statistics Canada 2016 Census of Urban Centres - Mother Tongue.

- The number of Ukrainians surveyed in **2016 census** by Statistics Canada saying that Ukrainian is their mother tongue has decreased by 8.1% to 102,485 from 111,530 and represents 7.5% of the 1,359,655 Ethnic Ukrainians.
- Toronto continues to have the largest Ukrainian mother tongue population of 26,550, which increased by 4.0% and represents 25.2% of the Ukrainians in Canada (based on mother tongue). This increase is probably due to the large influx of Ukrainian speaking immigrants from Ukraine, which have chosen Toronto as their home.
- Edmonton has the second largest Ukrainian mother tongue population of 11,770, which decreased by 12.6% and represents 11.2% of the Ukrainians in Canada (based on mother tongue).
- Winnipeg has the third largest Ukrainian mother tongue population of 8,785, which decreased by 15.5% and represents 8.3% of the Ukrainians in Canada (based on mother tongue).
- Ukrainians have become more urban over the last 5 years with almost 86% of mother tongue Ukrainians living major urban centres.
- There has been a slower decline in the number of mother tongue Ukrainians in the urban centres – declined by 5.6% compared to 20.8% in the smaller centres and rural Canada.
- The number of mother tongue increased in Mississauga, Ottawa, Oakville and Barrie partially due to recent immigration from Ukraine and due to Ukrainians moving further west and north from Toronto. Overall, the number of mother tongue Ukrainians increase by 1.0% in Ontario compared to the previous census.
